C. Head Start & Early Head Start:

1. PROGRAM MANAGER:

- Attended the final training from the Arkansas Department of Education on the R.I.S.E. Initiative. (Reading Initiative for Student Excellence)
- Completed all of the digital evaluation for teaching staff by entering data gathered from each Coordinator. Also completed evaluations on all Coordinators.
- Worked with Coordinating Staff to establish and work on 2 goals for the remainder of the year.
- Completed an analysis on the ABC Budget to offset costs in certain areas to ensure we have a balanced budget. Met with one of the new CFO Team members to review the budget.
- Updated the new CACFP Tracking Sheet for May to monitor spending and food cost agency wide for the month and completed the CACFP Reimbursement for the month of May along with the Nutrition Coordinator.
- Along with the Mentor Coach, updated all Education Component forms for 2021-22. This includes the units of study, education schedule, and all other educational forms used in the classroom.
- Delivered multiple education materials to classrooms that which provided through Covid-19 funds; this included multiple shelves and cubbies for classrooms. Assembled numerous shelves, carts, and tricycles.
- Completed the *May Teacher's Newsletter* for all teaching staff that included articles on education and nutrition and end of the year wrap-up.
- Attended the Arkansas Early Childhood and the Arkansas Head Start Association monthly meetings via Zoom.
- Held a team meeting/professional development event with the Coordinators to update the progress on component areas and classrooms. The topic of this meeting was all about "AIM". We discussed how are overall objectives in our respective component areas overlap and discussed our common goal- to educate both children and families!

3. ENROLLMENT, RECRUITMENT, SELECTION, ELIGIBILITY, ATTENDANCE:

- **ENROLLMENT UPDATE:** At the end of May we had 204 Head Start children enrolled and 48 Early Head Start Children for a total of 252. We are under enrolled in Head Start at this current time. OHS sent out guidance during the summer letting programs know that they would not be penalized for being under enrolled and grant funding would not be impacted during the 2020-2021 program year (as a result of the COVID pandemic).  - Family Support Workers are working hard to fill classroom enrollments for the 2021-2022 school year as they will not be working 6/26/21-7/26/21. For slots not filled the end of June, staff will work together when they return the end of July to help support and recruit those centers that may still have openings.

1. Recruiting New Board Members!

2. Department Improvements: Harrison, Community Services Building, COVID-19 barriers are in progress. Light fixtures that would have interfered with the walls extending to the ceiling and HVAC registers have been moved.

3. Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program:

- Non-Emergency and Crisis programs closed on Friday, April 30, 2021. Final check writing occurred on Wednesday, May 19, 2021.
- The Crisis (Extended Winter) program resumed Monday, May 17, 2021, using CARES funds.
 - Continuation of the Winter program, in that anyone who has already received winter crisis assistance will not be eligible for assistance with CARES funds.
 - Re-opened program will require either the balance of past-due/disconnect be paid off with the benefit provided OR clients will be required to open and show proof of a COVID-DPA with the energy provider.
- No updates from AEO (Arkansas Energy Office) regarding a water program. In video meeting with AEO on 3/25/2021, they mentioned a high likelihood that a water assistance program may be available in the near future with expectation to run similar to the energy assistance program.
- CARES LIHEAP is slated to begin July 12, 2021 and will cover WINTER FUEL.
- Summer LIHEAP is slated to begin July 19, 2021 and will cover ELECTRIC ONLY.

4. Community Services Block Grant (CSBG):

- FY 2021 second quarter report was emailed to the State on May 21st; it was due Friday, May 28, 2021.
- FY 2020 CARES annual report was submitted to the State on June 9th; deadline was Friday, June 11, 2021.
- DHS monitors will perform a virtual audit August 5, 2021. We have started submitting documents for review this month in preparation for that monitoring visit.

5. The 2021 Strategic Planning Process has started. The “Core Group” met June 17th and is comprised of 12 core members; including two members each from the Board of Directors, Policy Council, Administrative Staff, Child Development, & Community Services. A HUGE THANKS to those that offered to serve!

7. Mobile Micro-Shelter Initiative: Efforts have continued to place the two (2) completed micro shelters where they can do the most good for the residents of Boone County that are struggling with **homelessness**. The meeting between the Harrison Parks and Recreation Department and *Ozark Opportunities, Inc.* that was covered on the front page of the Harrison Daily Times has follow ups tentatively scheduled for the month of June so it is our hope to have progress to report on those efforts at the next Board Meeting. *Ozark Opportunities, Inc.* had a meeting with the NW Baptist Association on June 9, 2021 to discuss the MicroShelter program and other ways that we could assist the homeless population in our area via a partnership of these organizations.

8. Training Updates: Staff attended the ACAA Annual (virtual) Conference this month.

9. Staffing Updates: Ben, Cathy and Rebecca Hanlin have been actively interviewing candidates for the Family Development and Outreach Worker positions; Marshall and Clinton respectively. Both positions will assist residents in Searcy and Van Buren counties.

10. Emergency/Stability Programs:

Fresh Start Housing:

Ozark Opportunities, Inc. was awarded \$559,819 in funding from the Arkansas Economic Development Commission; \$236,819 from Corona Relief Funds and \$323,000 from Community Development Block Grant. Funds are to provide rental support to individuals at risk of eviction or whom have been evicted within the last 30 days. This program provides short term rental assistance (up to 2.5 months at Fair Market Rental value) to individuals and families in our six county service area that are experiencing housing instability as well as landlords who are experiencing loss of revenues due to the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. The program launched via an online application on www.arfreshstart.com on November 9, 2020.

CSBG Stability Programs:

- \$200,644 allocated for client-direct payments (CARES, Carry Over, 2021 CSBG).
- \$1,000 maximum benefit per household.
- Funds are available for:
 - Housing Assistance (IE: Rent Deposits, late rent, water deposits)
 - Transportation Costs (IE: vehicle repair, repo prevention)
 - Health & Well-Being Support (IE: eye exam/glasses, necessary dental expenses)
 - Employment/Education Support (IE: testing fees, licensing, certification)
 - Other Client needs addressed on a case-by-case basis

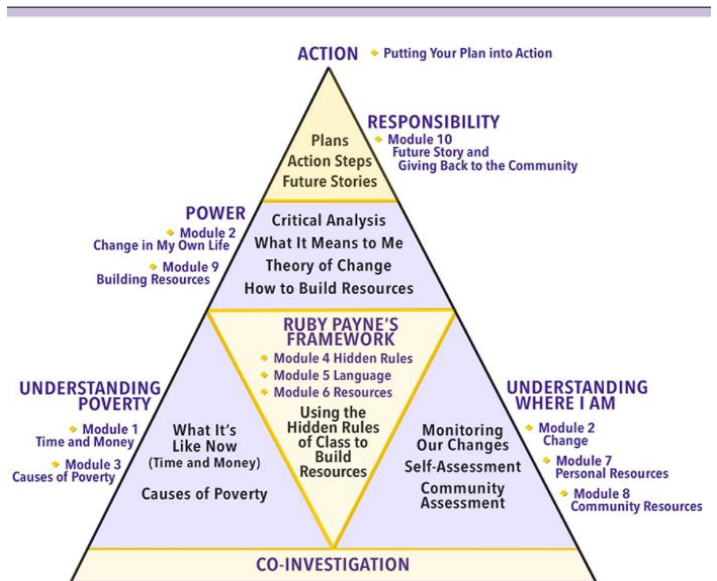

- May's Seminar focused on **Summer Energy Conservation**. This seminar provided information on techniques that can be utilized in all homes, regardless of ownership, that can decrease a family's energy consumption. The team is busy putting together energy conservation baskets for the households that completed the energy supply survey. The baskets may consist of energy efficient light bulbs, smoke/carbon monoxide detectors, caulk, weather seals, air condition cleaner, and other items that may be needed.



- June’s Seminar will explore ways for families to have ***Summer Fun While on a Budget.*** Children not in school can raise food and energy costs significantly. This fun seminar explores low cost ways to have fun during the summer on a limited budget.
- The *Getting Ahead in A Just-Getting-By-World* coursework is a going strong. Our first group will complete their curriculum this month. Our second group just recently started.



- **Success (with Fresh Start Housing) Story– “L.C.”**

On May 17, 2021, L.C called stating she needed assistance getting into a home for herself and her three-month-old baby. She said that she had been living in a local homeless center and was asked to leave due to rule violations. From there she went to a friend’s house in Ozark, Missouri, but left due to drug activity and returned to Harrison.

Back in Harrison, L.C. contacted House of Hope and they agreed to pay for a few days in a motel while she looked for a more permanent place. Since she had previously applied at Harrison Housing, they were working to get her accepted at Pioneer Ridge Apartments; however, L.C. said she had to vacate the motel room on May 19, which did not allow enough time for processing her voucher and preparing the apartment.

OOI staff spoke with Christi Johnson who is the manager at Pioneer Ridge and she was in contact with Harrison Housing to expedite L.C.’s application; however, Harrison Housing could not pay the deposit and first month’s rent. Ms. Johnson said that L.C. could move in on May 24, if we could cover those expenses. House of Hope continued L.C.’s stay in the motel for four more days to give OOI time to process the paperwork to assist her. OOI was able to pay one- and one-half month’s rent and the deposit on May 24 (which Ben Glover arranged with our finance office.) Ms. Johnson agreed to refund any rent overpayment once the housing voucher was received and L.C. and her baby moved in on May 24th. We have referred L.C. to our Success Program and are awaiting her response.

Harrison Housing, House of Hope, Pioneer Ridge and Ozark Opportunities, Inc. all worked together to make this transition into a smooth process, and were able to meet a real need for this young mother and her baby; this is what Community Action does!

- **Another Feel Good Story – “K.A.”**

Several days ago, our Harrison Outreach Office received a call from a lady trying to help a disabled veteran get into permanent housing. OOI staff explained the Fresh Start Housing Program to her and told her the vet should call when he finds a place. On 6/18/21, the woman brought “K.A.” into the office to apply for help.

K.A. is a veteran who has been diagnosed with congestive heart failure. He is dealing with the V.A. for benefits but has no income at this point. He was evicted from his apartment in Missouri back in May and has lived in his car and a motel in Springfield when the Harrison Veterans group found him. They urged him to come to Harrison and put him up in a motel, took him to Tower Manor Apartments and finally brought him to OOI to see what could be done for a permanent housing arrangement.

Tower Manor is now leasing an apartment to him and we are helping with the Fresh Start Housing Program. When they left the OOI office this morning he was going to was Camp Jack in Harrison to see what other assistance might be available for him. K.A. has an Associate’s Degree, is very computer literate and quite bright, it is hoped that if he can get proper medical care and support services he will be able to get back on his feet and have a bright future.

May was a strong month for the SUCCESS Family! Instead of our family highlight, we wanted to show you the achievements reached this month:

- We have 2 Participants that completed their respective nursing programs.
- 5 participants completed the Spring College Semester and were on the Dean’s List.
- 10 participants obtained employment, received a promotion, or an increase in pay
- 2 households that were homeless have obtained a safe and affordable home.
- Other goals attained for the month include, multiple vehicle repairs, medical procedures, purchase of a vehicle, obtained a driver permit, and opening of a savings account(!)

12. **Healthy Families Arkansas – Ozark Mountains; May Activity:**

- Total enrollment of 26 families (87% capacity) – 13 in each county
- Received no new referrals, but have 3 families in recruitment
- Enrolled 1 new family in Van Buren County
- Completed 42 home visits (75% completion rate)
- Checked 3 car seats and provided installation support as a UAMS Satellite Site for Child Safety
- We submitted our documentation for the HFA Fidelity Assessment and received our agenda for our day of interviews and meetings with our reviewer that will be held on June 9.
- The program received their quarterly report from Arkansas Home Visiting Network and had great numbers! Our completion rate for depression and child development screenings and intimate partner violence education were all at 97% and above.
- **Arkansas Nursery Alliance / Maternal AR. Home Pilot Project for Van Buren County**
 - Arkansas has the 3rd highest rate of infant mortality in the United States...and it is not on the decline. In response, state legislators passed funding (titled Maternal AR. Home) to address this issue, along with low rankings in women and infant health.
 - Melissa Smyth participated in the first Arkansas Nursery Alliance call that discussed the Maternal AR Home funding. This is legislative funding to add 5,000 home visiting slots (focusing on children birth to 2 years old) across the state through birthing hospitals (who must apply for the funding). The state has until January 1, 2022 to write rules and regulations for this funding and reimbursements will be made through Medicaid. All of this is part of the path to lower infant mortality in Arkansas.
 - The *Arkansas Home Visiting Network* is working on connecting with hospitals who are applying for this funding and encouraging them to partner with local home visiting programs (like our Healthy Families program with OOI) for their home visiting slots. This way, they do not have to create a new program from scratch and can just use their funding to add on a dedicated home visitor to the existing program.



Even though there is no birthing hospital within Searcy or Van Buren counties, we are still within the service areas of birth hospitals (like Conway Regional) and would be able to serve families in the rural areas who depend on maternity services in bigger cities. Over the next year, this group will meet and provide trainings to home visiting programs to make their program very attractive to hospitals who apply for this funding to want to partner with. They also want to get more hospitals involved in the Nursery Alliance or at least apply for the Maternal AR Home funding to benefit the local communities.

- May 7 – Melissa attended the virtual Arkansas Maternal and Child Health Symposium. This was a great, free training and educational opportunity tailored for Arkansas that coincided with the meeting earlier in the week about Arkansas' low rankings in women and infant health.
- May 24 – Attended the monthly call for the *Community Partnership Initiative* for the Van Buren county pilot project for children ages 0-5 to streamline the child developmental delay referral process.
- May 25 – Melissa and Brandi attended the virtual private screening of the documentary *Spare the Child* (produced by Justice Film Collective) hosted by Prevent Child Abuse America. The short film's theme was around the negative effects of physical punishment. The producer, director, and documentary participants attended as well and were able to talk more on the subject and answer questions that attendees had.



Congratulations to this HFA participant for graduating high school!

We couldn't be prouder of all her hard work and determination- Not only did she graduate while taking care of a baby and her home, she did it during a pandemic!

She also applied for and earned 3 scholarships to attend college in the fall.
